Synopsis

The Muldrew Lakes are in practice a single waterbody with two long narrow parallel arms situated between the bedrock ridges typical of the area and connected by a channel. It is believed that both species of bass were not native to the lake; though stocking occurred before the first survey was done. Smallmouth bass were stocked intentionally by the government as early as 1945. There is no record of largemouth bass stocking; they probably became established as a result of unauthorized stocking. Walleye have been introduced on two occasions but a reproducing population has not been become established. The tea-stained waters should provide good habitat for this species but the barren bedrock of the area and absence of significant tributaries may not supply suitable spawning areas.

Northern pike have been reported on more than one occasion by anglers. They have probably become established through an intentional, but unauthorized stocking.

A sculpin was submitted by an angler in 2011. Sculpins are probably native to the lake but due to their small size and secretive nature are seldom seen.
